

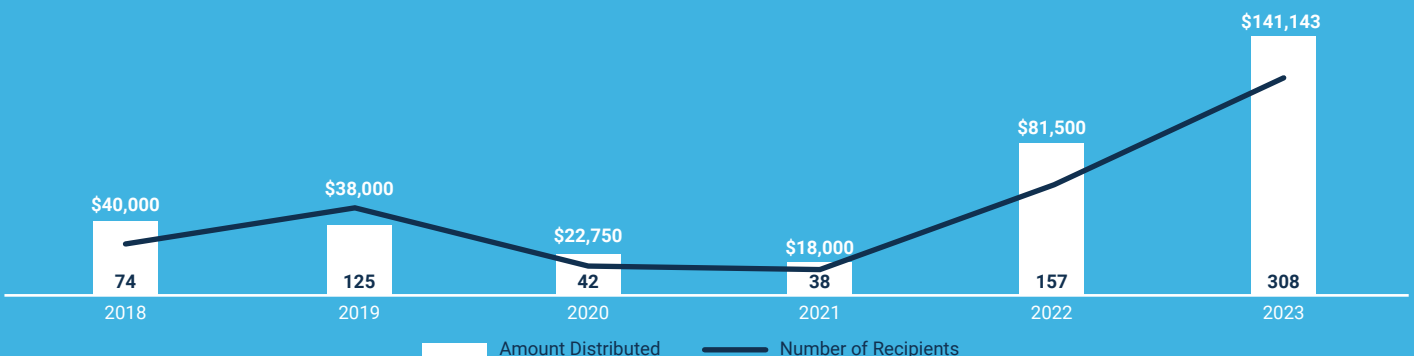

Thank you so much!! I really appreciate it! As a new student who has financial limitations, that is a huge help for me. *No words can express the gratitude I feel towards you and the foundation.* Mahalo!



My son is currently on his mission in Missouri and we are working on getting him a bike. We are definitely a low income family, *I am currently a single mom of four*, with lots of fun family health problems, including my parents, so work time is limited and any assistance we could get would be more than appreciated.



My parents who immigrated from Guatemala and Bolivia couldn't afford to put 3 kids through college back-to-back, especially when my dad lost his job 2 years ago. Currently me and my younger brother are paying everything at school, including our own insurance plus textbooks, and *with inflation making our rent increase I'm having a hard time surviving.*



My family and I are refugees from Brazil because we were threatened with death in Brazil. We arrived here with very little and with a terrible financial situation, *I want to serve a full-time mission, because I want to repay God for all that he has helped my family*, because even with the difficulties, He protected us.



*My siblings and I are triplets and are going on missions simultaneously, which has put a significant financial burden on my family.* Despite my best efforts to prepare financially, the costs associated with travel, accommodations, and supplies for multiple missions have added up quickly.



As an international student from Eswatini, we came to the United States with the goal of pursuing an education in Business. Our aim is to gain the knowledge and skills necessary to start our own social business back home to *help combat the 70% unemployment rate in our country.*



*I grew up in a big family of 13.* My father is a farmer and my mother is a housewife. The whole family doesn't have a stable source of income and I was obliged to work to be able to help my family with everyday expenses for food and bills, and *my earnings were not enough to support my tuition fees.*



*This past year has been a little difficult considering my mom had lost her job.* I first got my job with the idea that all my money would go towards savings for my mission, but of course my circumstance changed and so did my purpose for my job. I wasn't working for myself anymore I was working for my family.



He could use the financial help to buy the necessities he will need in Korea. He is 6'4 320 lbs. He won't be able to purchase anything in Korea due to his size. He also wears a size 16 shoe. *The family has been struggling financially due to a sibling who has had major medical needs.*



*My family with 9 kids has always been living paycheck to paycheck* and we grew up with food stamps because my parents never made enough for our family. It's hard to find the money for all of the extra stuff that doesn't consist of bills and rent.
